Our Core Convictions

As an Anabaptist community, we recognize that we are journeying² towards these convictions that are central to our faith:

- 1. God, the creator of the universe, is a God of love, and longs for mercy and justice, both for humanity and creation.
- 2. We follow in the way of Jesus, whose life, death and resurrection teaches us how to live.
- 3. Jesus showed us a way of shalom, non-violence, and alternatives to empire responses of power and dominion over others.
- 4. As Jesus gathered his disciples together to eat with sinners and saints-throughout his ministry, at the last supper, and after the resurrection--we too gather, to share communion, to eat together, to share our joys and sorrows, and to give and receive counsel. We are part of each other's lives, bound to each other in deep, meaningful ways.
- 5. Our discipleship leads us to serve God and others, and to have the grace and vulnerability to be served as well.
- 6. Water baptism is an expression of commitment to begin the journey of discipleship. We welcome those who desire to begin that journey to make a public confession of faith, and receive a blessing of the congregation and the Holy Spirit.
- 7. We study scripture with each other, aligning our story with the biblical story. We welcome the winds of the Holy Spirit to blow through us, giving us wisdom to discern where God is calling us.
- 8. We strive to live lives of simplicity, using our resources wisely, and recognizing the impact of our consumerism on God's creation and on our spirits. ³

²We recognize that we don't believe these core convictions 100% of the time. We lean towards belief in these convictions, knowing that God gives us faith and courage to live these convictions together. When we do not believe them, we know we can count on others in the church to hold these convictions for us. ³These core convictions are what we will use in our membership rituals with new covenanters. It's also what we will use in our yearly covenant affirmation service. This document will replace our thirty year old Congregational Covenant. It will not replace our Vision Statement.

Our covenant

As a community of God's people, we receive with joy God's gracious love. In response, we join in worship and praise and make this covenant with God and with each other. We affirm our faith in God, the source of life and love, the Sovereign of the world. We commit ourselves to follow Jesus Christ, who redeems, reconciles, and reveals God to us. We invite God's Spirit to transform, empower and guide us, as together we discern and follow God's word. We pledge to nurture and care for each other and call out the gifts of each person. We repent of sin, both private and social, and join God's plan for healing the earth and bringing peace and justice to its people. We accept God's call to share the good news of redeeming love, and invite others to faith in Christ and membership in his church. We encourage and pray for each other as we live out this covenant in hope for the time when God brings all of creation to its fullness in Christ. -Covenant: adopted March 1993

Assembly practices

We believe our Covenant calls us to the following practices in this time and context:

1. Active participation in congregational life

- 1. Worship God calls us to be the church; not an audience. We encourage participants to nurture gifts for teaching, preaching, leading and otherwise contributing to our corporate worship.
- Discernment members share responsibility for discerning the direction of the congregation in congregational meetings and in other discernment venues.
- 3. Community building small group participation is one important way we build community and invite others into the life of the congregation.
- 2. Ongoing spiritual formation
- Spiritual practices in addition to participation in Sunday worship, we engage other avenues of spiritual growth such as practicing spiritual disciplines; attending spiritual retreats; meeting with a spiritual director; and regularly reviewing our stewardship of time, money, gifts, and other facets of faithful living.
- Nurturing children we seek to lead children to faith by the Christ-like love, care, and model we offer the young among us.
- 3. Spiritual journey we encourage each other to publicly claim and proclaim faith in God, and we also grant each other the freedom necessary for real searching and questioning.

- 4. Giving and receiving counsel we believe we are not an island unto ourselves but need the larger body of Christ for our mutual growth.
- 3. Acting on our commitment to biblical peace, nonviolence, and justice
- 1. Relationships our commitment to peace begins with fostering healthy relationships. We commit to practicing Christian love and faithfulness in our primary relationships, supporting healthy marriages and families, and seeking reconciliation in situations of brokenness.
- 2. Economics we seek to follow God by growing in grace and generosity, releasing more of our financial resources, and contributing an extra 2 % of our income as partial restitution to the exploited people of the world.
- Creation care we commit to better understanding our impact on God's creation and acting to reduce the adverse effects of our actions.
- Justice for oppressed people we advocate for concerns local and global, act on our biblical convictions against war/militarism, and are a congregation which seeks inclusion for our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters.

The points listed under each practice are not meant to define the totality of how we engage a particular practice. They are meant to highlight key aspects of that practice to which members are committed. Also, we intend for this list of practices to be periodically reviewed and for changes to be made as we discern new ways in which God is calling us to faithful discipleship. – Assembly Practices: adopted April 2010

Member Covenant Responsibilities of congregational members:

- 1. We commit ourselves to helping each other in times of crisis.

- 4. We will freely receive new members as Christ receives us.
- 5. We will open ourselves to fellowship with one another in worship, study, service, and discipline.
- 6. We pledge our willingness to give and receive counsel, to offer and accept forgiveness as part of this redeemed community.
- 7. We will do our best to lead a life in accordance with the Gospel of Christ.
- 8. We will attend regularly the services of the church and participate in the regular observance of the Lord's Supper.
- 9. We will willingly assume our share of the work of the Church.
- 10. We will bear the burdens of others in a spirit of mutual sympathy, and share their joys in a spirit of mutual celebration.

- living responsibly with the natural resources of the world that God has provided.
- sharing generously our personal and congregational gifts and resources for the benefit of all.
- living peacefully while actively working for peace and justice throughout the world.

We believe in God who is over all and through all and in all who in love created people to live in covenant with God and all creation.

We believe in Jesus the Christ who lived, died and rose again incarnating God's love to give us hope and courage as we live in our broken yet beautiful world.

We believe in the Holy Spirit who regenerates and builds up God's people revealing God's purpose and truth in the world through creation, history, and scripture.

We believe in the church whose purpose is to reflect God's love for humankind and to witness to God's saving work in history as Christ's body in the world.

We trust you God you choose us through your gift of grace you give us our reason for being you lead us with your word you invite us to participate in your kingdom.
